The Revelation of Jesus Christ – 14: The Heavenly Throne and God's Kingdom Come

Text: Revelation 11-12

Introduction

The Lamb slain and risen, murdered yet alive, reveals not only the truth about God but the truth about all of humanity and creation. Jesus is not one of many ways to God; He is the center of history and the sum of its meaning.

The scenes painted in Revelation 11 & 12 have noticeable parallels which help us understand these chapters.

. God's Temple and Witnesses (11:1-13)

- A. What temple was John measuring?
- B. How can John measure a temple and altar which metaphorically refers to Christ and His body?
 - i. 2 Cor. 3:16-17
 - ii. Eph. 2:19-21).
 - iii. Eph. 3:6
- C. Who are the two witnesses and what is their relationship to the temple?
 - i. Zechariah 4

- ii. 42 months, 1260 days, 3½ years
- iii. "If anyone tries to harm them, fire comes from their mouths and devours their enemies."

- D. Only when they have finished their testimony will they be able to be harmed.
 - i. Where do they lie dead?
 - ii. Resurrection (11:11)
 - a) Rev. 1:18
 - b) "the rest were terrified and gave glory to the God of heaven." (11:13)

1. The Seventh Trumpet and Kingdom Inauguration (11:14-18)

- A. Trumpets when losing a battle (Numbers 10:8-10)
 - i. 7 Trumpets of Canaan Conquest (Joshua 6)
 - ii. "You have taken your great power and have *begun* to reign."

Michael Goheen and Tim Sheridan: "God's kingdom is about the power of God breaking into history to restore the whole creation. It is restorative and comprehensive. But it is not yet fully here. There remains a battle with the powers of evil for the creation—a battle that will continue to the End. The church tastes of the power of the kingdom and therefore is a sign that points to the kingdom in its life, deeds, and words." (Becoming a Missionary Church)

III. God's Temple, a Woman, and a Dragon (11:19—12:6)

- A. The Ark of the Covenant
- B. First sign: a woman, but not just any woman.
 - i. She is clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet and a crown of 12 stars. (Gen. 37:9-10)
 - ii. She is pregnant and gives birth to a son.
- C. Next sign: an enormous red dragon with 7 heads, 10 horns, and 7 crowns on its head. Who is this dragon? (12:9)
- D. The dragon seeks to kill the male child.
 - i. Ascension
 - ii. The woman has to flee into the wilderness.

This becomes a picture of how God will perpetually protect the woman, who is Israel, both old and new, and the rest of her offspring... followers of Jesus!

IV. Cosmic Battle and Kingdom Inauguration (12:7—12:17)

- A. A Cosmic Battle (12:7-9)
 - i. The effect of Jesus' life, death, resurrection, and ascension:
 - a) Luke 10:18-19
 - b) John 12:31-32
 - c) Luke 8:26-33
- B. Satan is cast down; he and his minions are on the earth in pursuit of the woman and the rest of her seed, the church, the Israel of God (Gal. 6:16).
